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Preface

Kaliachak College is recognised as a reputed institution of higher education in the northern Bengal, located in the lap of nature beside a distributary of the longest river, the Ganga and surrounded by the horticulture of the orchard of litchi and mango trees as well as the plantation of eucal yptus, shisu, medicinal plants etc. Though the college is situated in a rural background this area enjoys the well connectivity of rail, road and air in a convenient setting. The young institution got the base beside the National High Way No. 34, it is only 26 K.M. from the nationally well-known Malda Town Rly. Station whereas the nearest Rly. Station Khaltipur distances only 2 K.M. to the north and the Farakka Rly. Station covers within 12 K.M. to the



South and the college is in between Netaji Subhas International Airport, Kolkata and Bagdogra Airport, Siliguri having 304 K.M. and 259 K.M. distance respectively.

Historically the location of the College bears an importance, as this area bears the sign of the memory and the monuments of the indigo revolution of the British Bengal. It also historically important prior to the British India. The Gour, the capital of the Sultani regime is situated to the North-East and the Lalbag, Mursidabad, the capital of the Mughal Nawabs is to the South- East. Through the long journey this area has a significance and it needs an educational boost up and keeping this in view people established the college. And the institution endeavours its level based to satisfy the interest of the the society as well as the nation.

Being a premier institution of higher education the Kaliachak College strives to empower the learners to grow academically, socially and emotionally by supporting to develop as independent thinkers and self-decision makers and problem solvers for excellence in class room and society. We ceaselessly encourage the involvement, input and participation of the learners and we assure the best professional quality with experience of the teachers supported by the administrative staff by providing the support services and opportunities to make this institution one of the best destination of academic excellence in the nation.

The institutional approach for the holistic development the college has made impact on society at large. We already catered the urban and rural need along with it we proceed to provide the essentials for the global learner. We facilitate the students towards the quality learning, by igniting the interest in research and entrepreneurial development through the enhancement of excellence in them. Among the colleges of West Bengal the Kaliachak College received the collaboration of Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh to organise a Short Term Course through the Centre for Academic Leadership and Education Management (CALEM). UGC, HRDC, AMU. It speeds the quest for quality of the college. We have submitted proposal to the Directorate of Distance Education for opening M. A. course in Bengali, English, History, Arabic, and Political Science in distance mode and we already received positive response from Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi, along with it the response from the Directorate of Distance Education, University of Burdwan and Vidyasagar University is waiting.

For quality teaching and learning the institution has set up a fine infrastructural framework to meet the needs of the learners, teachers and non-teaching staff. New buildings including class rooms, administrative office and a seminar hall are under the process of construction, a girls hostel is under construction, while a proposal for boys hostel is submitted. In service of the college community, the institution runs one spacious canteen, three reprographic centres as well as a computerized library with reading rooms along with e-journals and e-books. For physical fitness steps have been taken for one modern gymnasium in the campus.

For the skill development of the learners a well facilitated Language Laboratory is setup where the Certificate and Diploma courses in foreign languages like English, Arabic, German and French can be undertaken in addition to it Chinese is also in consideration. For up gradation of lesson transaction four digital class rooms are installed further it is decided for digitisation of hundred parent classrooms. A modern Conference Room with projection system is established to serve the purpose of the institution. An Open Stage adjacent to the green Play Ground serves the purpose of different co-curricular and extra-curricular functions, sports as well as annual functions of the college and the nearest institutions or NGOs.

To ensure continuous power supply a big generator is in the campus in addition to it invertors are also placed to serve the hours in emergency. An environment friendly Solar Energy Conservation Centre is already in the plan.

To serve the needs of the students the college has setup an Anti-Ragging Cell, an Anti-Ragging Squad to combat the menace of ragging. There are also Grievance Redressal Cell, Career Counselling Cell, Training and Placement Cell and a Remedial Coaching Centre in operation. Two units of National Service Scheme (NSS) have won recognition for their works for the underprivileged. The Sports Committee along with the Instructor achieves commendable success in DPI (State Government) organized sports. Farther NCC is being introduced in the current session.

The institution develops advanced level of Information Communication Technology in the campus for the promotion of teaching learning and research. The high speed 4G Wi-Fi with secure internet connectivity is accessible in whole range of the college boundary. In the library e-journals and e-books are available through INFLIBNET and SAGE which are accessed along with other books and journals.

The Alumni Association of the college extends support to the institution in various ways and takes active part in different functions of the college like Annual Sports, Magazine publication, maintenance of discipline, beautification of the college. Parents'- Teachers' Association of the college extends their hands to support in the prevention of the un wanted activities like Ragging, smooth running of the examinations etc. The Governing Body of the college plays effective role in the development and upliftment of institution by providing direction and assessing the execution of the decisions . The functional and very active IQAC takes necessary responsibilities for all the related action plan and execution of the same with the cooperation of other stake holders.

Executive Summery

Strengths

- Dependence on P.W.D. for civil and electrical works within the campus (for Girls Hostel) makes it difficult to complete the project in due time.
- Poor administrative staff to student/Faculty ratio acts as a hindrance to the smooth running of the administrative affairs of the college.

Opportunities

- Establishment of the IQAC during the post NAAC Accreditation (first Cycle) and its activities has sensitized the departments regarding quality control, record maintenance, academic expansion, research and collaborations.
- Scholarships /Stipend from various sources namely Kanyashree Prakalpa, Bidi Labour Welfare Fund, Minority Welfare Fund, SC/ST Welfare fund along with the Students Welfare fund of the college for those meritorious and economically backward students encourage them for enrolling in the regular academic programmes and continuing the same.
- Value education and health awareness programmes for students including seminars, workshop and NSS activities in adopted villages with women and children inculcates a sense of responsibility in them.
- Faculty members carry out research activities and publish their articles in reputed journals managing the tight academic schedule of the college.

S-O Strategies

Challenges

- Little scope for introducing innovative teaching, learning techniques due to constraints in syllabi and annual academic schedule designed by the affiliating University which also limits the number of teaching days.
- Being a Government aided college the institution does not have scope of filling up vacancies in teaching and non-teaching posts.
 But the college authority may appoint the guest faculty and part time auxiliary staff (in urgent cases) to be paid from the college development fund.
- The stable staff structure necessary for the smooth running of the college (both academic and administrative) is often perturbed by the opportunistic staff especially faculty through availing the facility of lien.
- The pace of upgrading infrastructure is not commensurate with the annual increase in student intake as directed by the University as well as the State Govt.
- Transition of all administrative activities from paper-based work to paper-less, computer based handling is challenging involving reluctance to introduction of latest technological trends

W-O Strategies

- Generation of reserve funds for meeting contingent needs of the College and also to cater to needy students who fail to receive financial help from external agencies.
- Approaching Government for filling up of vacant teaching and non-teaching posts as well as creating new posts.
- Increasing teacher membership in boards of studies at the University level to ensure participation in academic designing and syllabus framing.

W-C Strategies

- Adopting management techniques to overcome difficulties of working with an understaffed administrative office.
- Generating resources and creating reserve funds for maintaining:
- ---General well-being of the College campus



- Departments with a reasonable number of students strength namely, Bengali (Hons), English (Hons), Arabic (Hons), Sanskrit (Hons & Gen), Geography (Hons & Gen), PolSc. (Hons), Education (Hons), Economics (Gen), Philosophy (Hons), conduct these unit test.
- ➤ But annual test is arranged for the subjects with more than 300 students for example History (Gen), Sociology (Gen), Education (Gen), etc as it is not possible to take unit test and declare result in due time well before the university conducted final examination.

Example: a copy of the unitized syllabus& Academic Calendar is attached in the Annexure No. 01& 02 respectively.

- 1.1.2 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?
 - The affiliating university maintains its procedure of revising syllabus time to time and supplies to the college.
 - The university appoints faculty members to the concerned Board of Studies (BOS) for the purpose of reviewing and revising the syllabi. The BOS besides deciding the Syllabi also finalize the question pattern and other related matters.
 - 1.1.3 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The college takes the following steps for the effective curricular delivery and transaction:

- Almost all the departments have their own departmental Chambers.
- The College provided all the departments with a computer;
- There is internet facility with all the departmental computers;
- The faculty members may meet the students individually in their chambers;
- They can use the computer to prepare the power point presentation in their departmental computers;
- For the latest development in a certain field the teachers may surf internet;
- There is ample scope for the teachers to undertake any research project. All the teachers are associated with research work:
- The college has developed four smart class rooms where teachers may impart lesson using the audio-visual aids.

- Teachers may save the board works in the smart class in puff format to fulfill the students' requirement in future both in soft as well as the printed form.
- College has a computer lab where the students may get access to meet their requirements;
- College has established laboratories for Geography, Physics, Chemistry, Botany and Zoology for the students as well as the teachers' research work;
- There is Central Library with reading room facility. Teachers and students usually get their required text and reference books from this library;
- Almost all the departments have their departmental library to meet the demand of text books of the poor and meritorious students;
- The college established a language laboratory with the soft skill course in English, in Arabic and the provision of courses in German and French are available. Besides the above mentioned fields the college made remarkable contribution in the field of power supply by arranging generator for the purpose.
- There is 24 hours uninterrupted power supply in the campus. There are two generator sets to ensure power supply at the time of load shading; Some of the subjects where there is no government approved full time or part time faculty, the college by its own initiative appointed guest faculties remunerated from the college development fund;
- College bears the recurring expenditures of the laboratories;
- Purchases books and journals form its own fund;

1.1.4 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

- The Kaliachak College decided to collaborate with the sericulture industry of the southern part of the Malda District.
- The organized a state level seminar on Dissemination of Sericultural Technology from Lab to Land sponsored by UGC in collaboration with the Central Silk Research and Training ,Berhampore, Murshidabad, (Government of India). It created important influence on the participants and the near about industries were benefited.
- The faculty members take initiative to have optimum support from the university by visiting the concerned faculty of the university and by inviting them in the college in programmes.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? (Number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stake holder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

Altogether five staff members were elected the members of the Board of Studies (BOS) viz. Mrs. B. Mishra(Associate professor in political Science) (2011-13), Mr. Subrata Das (Associated Professor in Economics) (2011-13 & 2015-17) and Dr. Tapan Kr. Chand (Sr. Asst. Professor in Education) (2011-13).Rajen Hemrom, Department of History and Somenath Halder, Department of Geography. It is to be noted that Mr. Subrata Das was elected the member for the 2nd term within the period. For remarkable contribution in restructuring the Under Graduate syllabus of Economics of the University of Gourd Bang, Mr. S.K.Das is appointed for the second tenure.

A workshop was organized by the department of Economics, Kaliachak College, Sultanganj, Malda, with the students of the department where the students expressed their views. They highlighted the facts of dearth of study materials in vernacular. They also expressed their dissatisfaction regarding the employability of the passed out students. Considering the issues Mr. Das submitted a report to the secretary of the BOS recommending the addition of a project work of 50 marks and the Indian Share market in the B.A. Part-III syllabus. If these recommendations are implemented, the students will get a better access in job market especially in the sharing trading.

In order to increase the supply of Students in this discipline it is also recommended to introduce Economics honours for those who do not learn elementary mathematics in their +2 level. However, a course of elementary mathematics is recommended to introduce into the syllabus to facilitate their learning. The recommendations are in the process to be placed in the Executive Committee of the University of Gour Banga for its final approval.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

A short Curriculum for the 3-months certificate course on Basics of Computer was developed jointly by the College and the Nehru Jatiya Yuba Kendra Centre, Malda. The syllabus developed by the entrusted faculty members and the staff member of the collaborating NGO placed in a workshop of all the teaching staff and Students representatives. Each and every item of the proposed syllabus was discussed in details in terms of content, teaching procedures, time requirements etc. and thus the finalized syllabus are imparted for the Computer literacy programme. There is also scope for the students to go advanced courses if they are interested.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The evaluative system is the best judge of the right implementation of curriculum objectives. There are two sets of question pattern: MCQ and Descriptive. MCQ set with OMR is designed for the enhancing the competitive skills of the students in the job market. Whereas the descriptive set is meant for judging the depth of acquired knowledge in the concerned subject. In some cases there are arrangements for viva-voce based on the project work or some application based activities e.g. project in Geography, Education and the mock youth parliament are few examples through which an impression of the realization of objectives may be obtained.

1.2 Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

In the present knowledge economy, the up to date information is key element for success. In information gathering, information storing and information dissemination computer is a must. Thus the institution arranged the course for the better prospect of its output. This literacy programme is not sufficient to enhance their skill but it will certainly encourage the students to go for the advanced courses for their professional need.

1.2.2 Does the institution offer programmes that facilitate twinning/dual degree? If 'yes', give details.

Along with general Degree courses the College twins to offer certificate courses in Basics of Computer Applications in collaboration with Jawarlal Nehru Jatiya Yuba Kendra, Malda for Computer application which aims to equip the students with such knowledge and training that they will be able to develop their entrepreneurial skills. In addition to that the Institution has planned to start self-financed career-oriented courses such as Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses in Arabic and English Language as well as Diploma in Lab Technician very soon. Initiatives for afore said courses have been taken as a language lab equipped with modern advanced technology is ready.

Choice Based Credit System and range of subject options

CBCS is not available; But Subjects mentioned in the above list are divided into two broad categories namely for arts and science. Students of arts may choose any of the subject under Social Sciences whereas the students from science may choose from the science subjects.

- Courses offered in modular form

Syllabus in restructured in modular form, but the module is fixed for a particular year. Students have little opportunity to choose his preferred module for a particular year.

Credit transfer and accumulation facility

Credit transfer and accumulation facility is directly not available in the affiliating university. But students may partially clear up of his stipulate subjects combination. For example a student in general course may opt for History, Education and Philosophy. But he could clear only the two subjects. In that case he/she will be allowed to clear the back log of third subject in the subsequent year along with the schedule course for the period.

For any Honours Course a candidate has to obtain 40 per cent marks. But if any one fails to secure 40 present but could manage at least 35 per cent in that case he/she will be promoted to the subsequent course; but he/she has to compensate the shortage of marks by scoring extra marks over and above the schedule of 40 per cent.

Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

If any candidate opted for Honours and at the end of the first annual examination realizes that he/she will not be able to cope up with the course, he/she may surrender his/ her honours course and undertake general course provided he could secure at least 30 per cent marks in the first year Annual Examination.

Enrichment courses:

A short term course of 07 days on 'Gender Equality' will be organized in the college in collaboration with the Centre for Academic Leadership and Management CALEM\ HRDC Aligarh Muslim University (AMU), UP.

- The college offers B. Sc. Course as self-financed one. Along with it certificate courses in Basics of Computer Applications in collaboration with Jawarlal Nehru Jatiya Yuba Kendra, Malda and the Institution has planned to start Self Financed career-oriented courses such as Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses in Arabic and English Language as well as Diploma in Lab

Technician very soon.

- Institution introduced Computer Literacy Programme for the students of the college in order to facilitate their entry into the job market. Computer Literacy Programme was introduced with a view to arouse interest and attraction towards computer so they may undertake advanced courses to fulfill their professional need in future.
- The Institution also developed a Language Lab for learning the foreign language of English and Arabic. English being the international language has a wide access into developed economy of the European and American countries where there is a greater job opportunity for the Indian Human resources. The college is planning to inaugurate the lab for the students very soon.

The College has only the traditional face to face mode of education. In this mode there are some subjects in a group categories for Humanities and some are for Science category out of which one can choose any three field from a single category subject to the availability in the institution of his/her choice.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The college is located in a Muslim Minority dominated backward are. As there is a wide gender gap in terms of literacy the NSS units of the college undertake a scheme of literacy programme for the illiterate women of bidi workers. The female volunteers go to the houses of the workers of the adopted village and teach them the three arts of learning namely reading, writing and arithmetic. The student volunteers perform this duty during the vacation and their off time.

In order to minimize the illiteracy in general and women illiteracy in particular the institution is availing the benefit of the Kanyashree Prakalpa for the girl students. According to this scheme a girl completing her eighteen years old continuing study and staying unmarried till then is eligible for a stipend of Rs. 25,000/-(twenty five thousand) for her higher study from the government of West Bengal. The College authority receives application from the eligible girl students, and forwards them to the govt. of West Bengal. This scheme has a significant positive impact on the number of girl students attending higher

education institutes. And we believe that the educated mother will certainly achieve the fully literate society in near future.

Report on the Workshop

Under Graduate Course of the University of Gour Banga

This is here by reported that a Workshop was conducted on the 16th Oct. 2015 at the college premises to take the students and faculty members feedback regarding the syllabus of U.G. Economics General Course. Dr. Nazibar Rahaman, Principal, Kaliachak College was the Chairman of the Session. Mrs. B. Mishra, Associate Professor, Deptt. of Political Science, Mr. G. K. Baroi, Asst. Prof. of Political Science, Dr. S. Saha, Asst. Professor in Geography, S. Holder, Asst. Prof. In Geography, Dr. S.Bala Coordinator of IQAC along with the Two faculty members S.K. Das and S. Javed of the deptt. Of Economics were present in the Workshop. Altogether 35 students participated into the feedback session.

Mr. S.K.Das, HOD, initiated the discussion on the existing UG syllabus of Economics General Course. He delivered a power Point Presentation where he pointed out several issues; out of this aimlessness of the Syllabus is the main point. It is said that the syllabus failed to show any light to the Students into their dark future. As a consequence, it fails to attract many students and without students it gradually becomes too feeble to maintain its existence.

The Issue of Mathematics was discussed in details. It was pointed out that confusion was created over the admission of Economics honours regarding the compulsion of Mathematics in the H.S. level. As there is scanty of Students of the requisite qualification the condition may be relaxed for non-mathematics students if arrangement can be made for teaching necessary mathematical tools with in the syllabus in the UG level. But unfortunately during the last 8 years our BOS could not do the same.

The rigidity of the syllabus is another drawback. The Syllabus could not been modified with the need of the time. For example it is said that Share market is an emerging sector in the Indian Economy. Many Peoples are getting their lively hood in this sector, but our syllabus is completely silent regarding the issue. Even the syllabus cannot arrange any stand for the students to be acquainted with the issues of the local economy. After completion of their graduation course they fail to identify the strength and weakness of their local economy.

Job opportunity of the course was also scanned in the workshop. As it is not a school teaching subject the student are not ready to give up the chance of a school service for choosing Economics; because in that case the opportunity cost of choosing Economics will be too high. Unless new horizon of job opportunities is open to the students they will not be attracted to the stream.

The Syllabus is short and easy for a beginner of economics. But there was no chapter-wise distribution of class to show the relative weightage which is necessary criteria for a modern syllabus. Sometimes it is found that several questions were put from the same chapter keeping other as barren. It was also discussed that a student after his/her admission wants to know: what are the expectations of the teachers from him in terms of Class Attendance, Preparation for the assessment and gradation. The syllabus is silent regarding these queries of the students. It is true that sometimes the university separately declares various rules and regulations. But those are official; and not directly reach to the students. Say for example University declared MCQ type of question last year; and a student gets admission in the current year. Is it possible for him to find out the notice to know details about the examination? In That case he/she has to depend on the hear say of the previous year students. This is certainly not justified.

The behavioural issues were also discussed in the workshop. Students alleged that there is no remuneration for disciplined campus life. Students who are rowdy, miscreants, and adopting unfair means in the examination are not handled with sufficient stringency. Rather they are the leader of the campus and common students are afraid to raise their voice against them. Neither the syllabus nor the administration has any answer to this issue. The same thing is true for the attendance of the students also. There is a direction that a student is to attend at least 75% of the classes. But it is not mentioned in the syllabus. As a result the students cannot see the direction directly. Thus the picture of the class room, as we see, is very thin in attendance.

Susanta Mandal, one of the B.A. pt.III students pointed out that the syllabus is suffering from the shortage of text book in vernacular. He alleged that there are so many text books in the PDF form free in internet. But In case of Bengali there is not a single book is free in the websites. Poor students who cannot purchase their books may access that free version if it were available.

Sultan Sk. is also a Pt.III student. He pointed out that India Economics is more important for WBCS examination. There is a complete paper on the five year Planning. But the other two Papers viz. Micro and macro economics are not very much useful for competitive examinations.

Sonatan Mandal student expressed his view that the syllabus is short and easy to understand. But it has very little use in job market. The theoretical Knowledge of economics hardly comes to any use in our daily life. He said my father was a business man. I never found him talking about utilities, indifference curve, price elasticity of demand etc. But as far as I know he was a successful businessman.

Under these circumstances, following recommendations are made for the consideration of the Board of Studies for the Under Graduate Council:

- > Opportunities of the Study of Economics should be focused through the Syllabus;
- > Syllabus should be modified to keep pace with the demand in the job market;
- Text book in vernacular has to be increased; some of the reading materials in pdf form may be uploaded in the institutional Websites;
- There should be scope to ventilate the issues relating to the local economy into the syllabus;
- Marks should be distributed over the chapters according to their relative importance and length;
- No. of Class should be allotted over the chapters of the syllabus;
- Arrangement is to be made to teach the mathematical tools to those students who did not learn it in their H.S level.
- > Students behavioural criteria in the academic institution is to be reflected through the Syllabus though it is common for all the subjects;
 - Lastly, Admission criteria should be modified to accommodate the students who have no mathematical background.

CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

- Institution publishes the notice for admission in institutional website as well as in the college notice board. In the website admission forms and prospectus of the institution are made available.
- Recently the college has started online admission process.
- If any discrepancy arises regarding the admission process, it is solved by the admission committee of the college instantly in rational and justified manners as per the rules and regulations prescribed by the affiliating University.
- Merit lists are prepared sincerely and strictly on the basis of merit by using the software.
- All relevant documents for admission are very sincerely verified manually by faculties and clerical staff of the college.
- Government policy for reservation (SC, ST, OBC-A, OBC-B) in higher education is properly followed by the institution.
- Rules and regulations for admission as prescribed by the affiliating University are followed by the admission committee. The committee is formed under the president ship of the Principal incorporating senior teachers, non-teaching staff and student representative. It controls the whole admission process with the cooperation of all teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other)
- The Admission is completely merit based,
- The candidates opted for honours course in any language The candidates who passed the Higher Secondary or Equivalent Examinations must obtain at least either:
- i) 45% marks in the aggregate and also 45% in the subject concerned, or
- ii) 40% marks in the aggregate and 50% marks in the subject
- For SC/St candidates the minimum marks for eligibility shall be 5% less.

- In case of back year candidates, 5% marks will be deducted from RANK for each year lapsed
- Admission to B.A/B.Sc. (Bio) First year Hons. And General courses are made strictly on the basis of the merit panel prepared as per university norms.
- Merit List is prepared as per the formula advised by the University of Gour Banga and is given on the Admission Form.
- Candidates opted for Hons. in any Social Science are eligible to apply without having the concerned subject in their +2 level. However in that case his/her subject marks will be treated as zero in calculating the RANK.
- Candidates with vocational stream approved by the Govt. Of West Bengal are eligible to admission in the General courses only as per guidelines of affiliating University.
- The formula for calculating the merit:

 Subject (opted for Honurs) + Grand Total of The best of Five Subjects including English but Excluding Environmental Studies /6 = RANK
- After publication of merit lists counselling for different honours subjects are conducted and eligible candidates may take admission according to ranks in merit lists.
- All eligible candidates (cleared higher secondary / 10+2 equivalent examination) may take admission in General courses. In case of laboratory based general subjects the merit lists are prepared according to seat capacity then the listed candidates may take admission.
- Admissions of the candidates are confirmed after verification of relevant original documents.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.
- The institution follows strictly the guidelines of the affiliating university i.e. University of Gour Banga. Only the eligible candidates (minimum 45% marks in the concerned subject, 45% marks in aggregate or 40% marks in concerned subject and 50% in aggregate) may apply for admission in B.A and B.Sc, honours courses.
- All eligible candidates (cleared higher secondary / 10+2 equivalent examination may take admission in General courses. In case of laboratory based general subjects the admissions are taken based on merit lists according to seat capacity.
- All the colleges under the affiliation Gour Banga University follow similar structured guidelines prescribed by the affiliating university.
- Neighbouring colleges within the district or surroundings are also affiliated to the same university and there is no autonomous college here. So, there is no remarkable difference for the eligibility of the candidates for the admission in different courses of this college and other colleges.

- 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes', what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?
- Yes.
- The Admission Committee of the college reviews the admission process annually. The Principal and the Admission Committee with the Heads of the departments in several times, with a necessary interval, conducts meetings for the reviewing and monitoring of the admission process. The IQAC also performs active role at the time of its annual planning and evaluation meeting.
- The annual review and monitoring strategy helps in deciding improved and transparent admission procedure of the college. The discrepancies in the admission process is minimised by such practices.

- 2.1.6 Provide the following details for various programmes offered by the institution during the last four years and comment on the trends, i.e. reasons for increase/decrease and actions initiated for improvement.
- The Seat availability is determined by the Department of Higher education and the affiliating university. The College has to follow the same.
- Almost all the departments admit their full capacity. However, there are a few departments facing the dearth of eligible students. These are Deptt.of Economics, Deptt. of Political Science and Deptt. of Geography.
- These subjects are not school subject. Hence the students who aspire to be the school service do not choose Economics, Political Science etc. Moreover Economics Hons. requires Mathematics in the +2 level as a combination subject. But with Mathematics combination Pure Science is better option than Economics Hons. in respect of school service.

In case of Department of Geography most of the affiliating colleges under University of Gour Banga have started Honours Course in the subject, so the number of willing candidates who asked for Geography (General) is decreasing.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- There is 2 % seat reservation in Honours courses for differently-abled candidates.
- There is a provision for relaxation of tution fees for differently-abled candidates.
- Permanent ramp for differently-abled students is constructed.

- The wheel-chair also been provided for the convenience of accession to reach the class-rooms.
- ➤ Hearing aids are also provides to the differently-abled students as per requirement.
- For Blind Students writer is provided during the examination with the prior approval of the affiliating university

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

- Yes. The criterion for admission is merit alone. To ensure that merit list of score of the willing candidates mentioned in the merit list are verified with original documents by the members of Admission Committee.
- Before starting online admission, during admission there is a students' Help Desk to address the needs of the applicants. Moreover the students are counselled on the day of the admission to help them to take admission to the desired subjects and courses.
- > Currently the admission process is conducting through online, except verification of original documents.
- The Admission Committee sits before the admission starts. This body considered all the possible requirements of the upcoming students. And the necessary arrangements are made accordingly. This arrangement includes the sitting arrangements, books, classroom and space, Teachers, drinking water supply etc.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

- Some special tutorial classes are taken for the backward learners other than scheduled classes at the very beginning of the academic session.
- Sometimes UGC-sponsored Remedial Coaching is conducted by the faculties of the institution for the SC/ST/Minority students.
- For the Honours course internal Unit Test to reveal the strength and weakness of the learners. Essential remedies are taken for the benefit of backward and advanced learners as per result of Unit Test.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- An internal seminar on Women's Empowerment has been conducted by the Dept. of Political Science. Moreover in every sphere and activities of this institution women (Teacher & Students) have been encouraged to active participation.
- In this college there is no discrimination made on the basis of ethnicity, religion, caste, region, language, social status etc.
- The institution has NSS unit, which not only engaged to aware the students but also engaged in creating small-scale social forestry in neighbouring areas.
- There is an Ayurvedic Garden ("Charak Bithi") planted and maintained by the NSS.
- There is a small Litchi Orchard in the college campus which is not only source of fund but also functioning in ecological balance.

- The Garden Supervision Committee helps to maintain the scenic beauty of the college.
- The college has recently planed to install Solar Light for encouraging ecofriendly alternative energy source.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified through the performance in class and on the basis of the result of internal Unit Test. Special classes are taken by the faculties for advance learners and study materials are supplied for the same.

- Remedial classes and entry-in service coaching under the scheme of UGC are also organised by the institution sometimes.
- Advanced books are provided to them in order to meet their demand for knowledge.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
- The academic performance of the students is best understood by the examination results. College Level Unit Tests are conducted regularly and records are kept in departmental records. These data assist the faculties of this college to advice and guide the students and also counsel those who are weak and who fail to handle with the academic standard.
- Remedial classes are taken by the faculty members of the institution to help the weak-learners. The Remedial classes are conducted internally by the institution. Moreover sometimes remedial classes under the scheme of UGC are also organised by the institution.
- The identified candidates with threat to drop out due to financial crisis, going outside the state in search of job, due to lack of job security etc. are brought under general counselling by the concerned department. Sometimes, special counselling is given individually.

For Example Sonatan Mandal B.A. Part-II regular students in 2014-15 academic session, suddenly discontinued his studies. Sri S.K. Das a faculty of the Department of Economics called him in his chamber and investigated into the cause of his absence. He reported that due to his father's death he has to maintain his father's business of bidi wrapping and hence he is not in a position to continue his study. But after a prolong counselling he agreed to continue his study. He appeared B.A. Part-III final Examination in 2016.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
- The institution publishes the Academic Calendar every year and it is circulated among the faculty members and the students.
- The modules of the syllabus are prepared in a departmental meeting on the eve of each academic session.

- The students are evaluated internal both by written unit test and annual examination. But the affiliated university (University of Gour Banga) conducts only the annual final examination and the evaluation. The process of evaluation is as follows:
- Unit Test There are 3 Unit Tests conducted for Honours courses to ensure continuous assessment.
- Compensatory/Remedial Test The unsuccessful students in college internal unit tests are also evaluated through Remedial Test.
- Annual Test Examination These is one annual test examination for each year (1+1+1) for General Course conducted for evaluating the students of general course.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- The members of IQAC organize meetings through which monitoring of all seminal academic activities including research activities pursued by the faculty members of the respective departments.
- The IQAC motivates the teachers to conduct the classes through ICT. It also discuss for opening of advance learning courses PG, Career oriented courses.
- A Research Culture Motivation Committee (RCMC) is activated under the guidance and supervision of IQAC.
- The IQAC regularly inspires the teachers to enhance the environment of 'research culture' and also inspires for creative writings in various journals, books and store the records of publications regularly.
- The State Government, guided by UGC norms, has recognised the role of the IQAC by including its participation as an internal sanctioning authority of Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).


- 2.3.3. How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
- The technique of class room teaching is generally unique for each teacher depending upon his/her in born teaching capability. But to make the classes more attractive for the learners, the teachers are equipped by the modern educational techniques, and are being applied by the teachers in the classrooms. The tools and aids like overhead projectors (OHP), LCD projectors are made available to the teachers.
- In this institution four smart classrooms have been developed for modern teaching. Other than these one OHP and one portable LCD projector are provided as per need.
- The institution has Wi-Fi internet facility through which learners can access study materials as and when they need.
- Institution and UGC sponsored Internal/National/State Level Seminars are organized by the institution to inculcate updated knowledge among the learners and teachers.
- Well-equipped Language laboratory is established by the institution to enhance the efficiency in English and Arabic language of the advanced learners. The institution has also plan for starting the training in Chinese language. There is also provision of learning of German and French language in this laboratory but not started.
- The institution has hi-tech conference room for conducting State, National and International level conferences to enhance the skill and efficiency of the teachers and learners.

To develop the interactive learning collaborative learning and independent learning among the students the institution takes steps by providing the aforementioned facilities and also organizes seminar on such topics.



2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The institute encourages debates and dialogues method without neglecting the structured syllabus of affiliating university, especially in contemporary issues during class teaching. This kind of arena of thinking may help the learners to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. The learners have the liberty for interaction in the classrooms and laboratories and during excursions and educational tours, among them and with the teachers.
- The learners are inspired to participate in inter and intra college debate/quiz competition/seminars so that their communicative skills, knowledge and critical thinking are enhanced.
- Departmental seminar organised by the concerned departments under UG syllabus related topics. In these seminars both teachers and students may take part actively.



- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning—resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
- The college subscribed e-learning resources. There are more than 1, 25,000 e-books and 25000 titles of e-journals. All the faculties are encouraged to use available e-books and e-journals as per their need. Internet facilities are also available for promoting research activities by the faculties.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Most of the departments of this institution organize seminars and workshops to enrich the learners and faculties academically. Resource persons are invited to deliver lectures on specific topics related to themes of seminars. Thus there is a provision of sharing of knowledge amongst the faculties, learners and resource persons from the university and other institutions. Before organizing seminars and workshops, departments discuss the topics in advance, prepare souvenir and conduct background research.
- ▶ Blended Learning: Inter-disciplinary approach of learning is quite common at the classroom teaching. For example inter-disciplinary classes are conducted by the Department of Geography and Economics, Political Science and History, Bengali and English, Chemistry and Physics etc. Five inter-disciplinary National seminars sponsored by UGC and organized by the Department of Geography, Economics, Bengali, History and Education respectively. Two state level seminars organized by the Department of Economics and Political science. Such seminars are helpful for blending the knowledge among the faculties of the institution.
- **Expert Lectures**: Some departments bring resource persons from various universities and neighbouring colleges for conducting special lectures.
- Seminars: Seminars are standard enrichment programmes. And under these programmes UGC/Govt. sponsored/self -financed National, State-Level and institutional seminars are being conducted. Students are also participated in these programmes.
- ➤ Workshops: One UGC sponsored State-Level Workshop and two internal workshops have been conducted by the college and the faculties, sericulturists and students took part in these programmes.

- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/ benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counselling/ mentoring/ academic advise) provided to students?
- Since academic counselling and mentoring are part of a long established structure and very need based and conducted in a humanitarian way statistics are not maintained. Both the advanced and weak learners are counselled by the faculties of the concerned department for the betterment of exam result and future academic plans. If any psychological and behavioural problems arise in any learner the faculty of the concerned department extended hand of cooperation to the learners up to the reachable extent. Passed out students as and when come with different problems are solved in general by the concerned faculty members. For example: Rafiqul Islam a passed out student qualified the state level primary School Service exam. But due to his underage problem he was debarred from the interview. Rafiqul became hopeless. The financial background of his family was very week. Under these circumstances he was counselled by his teacher Sri S.K.Das and prepared him for the other competitive exams.
- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
- The departments of Geography, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, and Physics conducted the theoretical classes through lecture method as well as ICT enabled method and practical classes in laboratories. Field study method is also followed up by the Departments of Geography, Botany, and Zoology. The Department of Geography use RS&GIS software and satellite imageries to cope with the advanced need of the discipline in modern days. Moreover, other than the above mentioned departments, the Departments of Bengali, English, Sanskrit, Arabic, Political Science, Sociology, Economics, Philosophy, Mathematics undertake some form of innovative teaching through ICT method as well as lecture method.

The faculty members of a department take classes in other department befitting the topic to his or her spelization.

The teaching-learning process is further enriched

- Facilitating the students to access internet.
- > Use of portable OHP and LCD projectors.
- Four ICT smart classrooms.
- One Language laboratory.
- > One Well-equipped conference room.
- **Educational tours.**
- Visit to different nearby rural communities.

The institution organizes workshops/ seminars on teaching learning by inviting the expert from the university/college to enrich the faculty in that respect.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- Through the process of lending and spot reading of available text books the teaching-learning process is augmented.
- Through the recommendation of reference books and research works, accessing internet facilities to students the teaching-learning process may be augmented.
- Further the teaching-learning process may be augmented by facilitating the use of reference books and accessing internet facilities to the faculties separately. The library provides various facilities like reading section in the library, provision of photo copying, printing etc. to help the faculties.
- The library also has Wi-Fi connection. The library has joined the UGC's N-LIST programme (INFLIBNET) since 2015. E-journals and e-books can be availed by this. The library has installed library software SOUL-20 version since 2015. This is helpful for better acquisition, circulation, cataloguing, book reserves, bibliography services etc. But all these operation is in initiation mode.
- ➤ Other than the college central library most of the departments have departmental library for lending and reading of some reference and text books.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

Yes, the institution face few challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar, the factors are as follows:

- Lengthy annual exam schedule and evaluation process of the affiliating university (UGB).
- The college campus is taken by the Election Commission of India as well as the W.B. State Election Commission for election purpose for long period.
- During these process the institution does not declared full suspension of teaching learning process. Rather it always keeps continue the classes considering the availability of the space, faculty and importance of the courses.

The institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning by the mechanisms as follows:

Teaching learning methods/approaches:

- To enhance innovative teaching skills of a teacher Orientation and Refresher Courses are fruitful part of overall quality improvement. These courses are organized by UGC-ASC/HRDC of different universities in this regard the teachers avail duty leave from the institution.
- The college is going to organize a Short-Term Course and Orientation Programme in collaboration with Centre for Academic Leadership and Education Management, UGC-HRDC, Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh (U.P.). The Academic Leadership and Education Management, UGC-HRDC, Aligarh Muslim University has confirmed this proposal.
- The institution organizes programmes for the teachers when new technological devices are introduced and whenever necessary.

Handling new curriculum:

- To participate university level workshop convened for the familiarization of the new curriculum
- To organize a Short-Term Course in collaboration Aligarh Muslim University (AMU)
- To participate a special training for handling new software of GIS by the faculties of Department of Geography in the affiliating university—University of Gour Banga in the new syllabus.

Content/knowledge management:

To pursue the Ph.D. course work by the willing faculties the institution provides appropriate opportunity and assistance. Moreover short-term study leave also granted by college authority for the pursuing researchers.

Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

- Assessment: The impact of faculty enrichment is directly underwent in improved teaching and is under the purview of the IQAC and Teachers' Council.
- Cross cutting issue: Former Teacher-In-Charge participated in a UGC-sponsored Capacity building of Woman Managers in Higher Education (SAM Workshop) in 2014 in Malda Women's College, Malda. Dept. of Political Science conducted a one day internal seminar on the Women Empowerment through Local Self Government.
- Audio visual aids/ Multimedia: In this college under the RUSA scheme one Language Laboratory and one Conference Room, with audio visual aids, have been developed. Four smart classrooms have been furnished with audio visual aids also. Other than these there is portable audio system for many cultural and other purposes. In addition to that as multimedia aids this institution has 1 SLR-Camera, 6 Laptops, 37 Desktops, 1 OHP and 1 LCD projector.

The college becomes proud of such intentional rewards and the principal express his commit to the academic and administrative development of the institution and the nation along with the principal the staff are encouraged.

 - Yes. The students' feed-back information is maintain and scrutinized by the IQAC and Principal annually. Necessary correctional steps are taken by the individual teachers.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

Both teachers and learners are aware of the evaluation process (internal and under affiliating university) and reforms (internal) through institutional notification, faculty meetings, and teacher-student interactions in the departments and by holding respective departmental parent-teachers meeting.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- ➤ In the Under-graduate level (Honours and General courses) the Gour Banga University has introduced 1+1+1 system of examination for three years degree course from 2008.
- Though the syllabi of most of the subjects have been gone through modification in several times but the Gour Banga University made change in question pattern in 2015, i.e. introducing MCQ & OMR type in each annual module (1+1+1).
- ➤ The evaluation process constitutes of Theory and Practical examination at the end of each year conducted by the affiliating university (UGB) in a centralised way.
- The pattern of question has been re-formulated with introduction of essay type question of 10 marks and short answer type of questions of 5 marks in lab-based subjects. And in non-lab-based subjects introduced essay type questions of 20 marks, short answer type 10 and short answer type question of 5 marks. The MCQ type has been introduced in all subjects (Honours and General courses).
- The evaluation of practical examination is conducted through laboratory experiments, project works, field reports, computer based work, instrumental survey techniques* and RS & GIS* software operations and viva voce. (*applicable for Geography).
- There are few subjects (Economics, Education) which have introduced field survey based project work, preparation of project report followed by a viva voce.

Institutional Evaluation Reform

- Monthly Unit Test system
- Assignment system
- Quiz on the subject matters
- Departmental seminars on the subject matters.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

This is implemented through academic curriculum and notification through college prospectus (in hard copy before 2015) and institutional Rules and Regulations and notification of individual departmental Rules and Regulations.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative assessment approaches adapted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- For formative evaluation the college has its own process of internal assessment system through Unit Tests (Honours course) yearly test examination (General course). Remedial/Compensatory tests are conducted for unsuccessful candidate in the college Unit Test.
- After the publication of examination conducted by the affiliating university (UGB) the learners who achieved good marks are counselled by the teacher of the concerned departments for better achievement in the next examination. Remedies are also taken for the learners who have achieved below standard marks in the examination. By this way the learners are benefited.
- Few of the students also ranked in the university examination in part-I and part-II examination. Special care has been taken by the faculty of the concerned departments to sustain their rank.

e.g., Kalikinkar Das (passed out in 2012, Department of Geography) was confused after the publication of the result of B.A part-I but after counselling by faculties of Geography he was inspired and continued his study. He was successfully completed the honours course of the University of Gour Banga, under which the college is

affiliated to. The further monitoring and guidance helped him for completing PG and qualifying in UGC-NET (2015).

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

- During the last four years, to be specific, there has been no programmed system of rigor and transparency. Although there is no established evaluation system for the assessment behavioural aspect and communicating skills but the behaviour of the learners are groomed by personal interaction. The academic performances of the learners are assessed by internal examination system totally transparent, e.g. the evaluated answer scripts are reviewed by the concerned students.
- To encourage communication skills and independent learning students are encouraged to participate in seminars, write essays, participate in public debates conducted by the Govt. and Non-Govt. Organizations.

2.5.6 What is the graduate attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

The graduates 'desired attributes include—

- 1. Regular and good academic performance
- 2. An openness towards virtual career orientation

- There is a provision of Scrutiny and Reassessment of marks obtained in the University Examinations of each paper through the Head of the Institution. Students avail of this procedure and get Scrutiny and Reassessment done as per their necessity. The college also helps the students to apply for RTI for their grievances with reference to evaluation of University Examinations.
- In the college level there is provision of reviewing the evaluated answer scripts by the individual examinee. If he/she is unsatisfied with the credit given to, he/she may approach to the concerned teacher with the arguments. If it is found logical then and there the evaluation is rectified.

 - Yes. There is a Career Counselling Cell (CCC) which conducts workshops in collaboration with Private Companies and Organizations so that students and staff are made aware of performance and learning outcomes.

 - At the UG level the syllabus is structured in such a way that students can compete for competitive examinations. The Entry-in-Service Coaching is given by teachers for appearing in SSC, PSC Miscellaneous exams.

- Several professional courses have been introduced and some are planned to introduce in the college. These are as follows:

- Advance Diploma Course in Modern Arabic Language*

These enable students to select their future academic and professional courses through a new vista. (*Fourth coming)

2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

- The year-wise records of annual exam of UG (1+1+1) are maintained in the office. And the result of internal Unit Test results is maintained by the concerned departments for future planning of up-gradation.
- Contact with ex-students through telephone and sometimes they came to the concerned departments. The teachers of concerned departments practicing to introduce ex-students as an uncourageous manner to the present students, in this way academic exchange between past and present students partially maintained.
- The college does not have the authority to break the barriers of learning as the curriculum is managed by the affiliating university (UGB). But the members BOS from this institution (Dept. of Geography, Economics, Education, History, Pol. Sc.) play vital function in syllabus formation and modification. Dept. of Economics organized in-house workshop (2015) on students' feedback for UG Economics syllabus.

2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

By the monitoring of the learner's class response, performances in Unit Test, field work (Project) and in-house seminar presentation, affiliating university annual examination results (UG) the institution ensures the achievements of learning outcomes.



Recommendation of this committee,

- > All the faculty members are to be involved in research work.
- All the faculties are to submit proposal to the UGC for their project work.
- > The faculty members are required to submit list of reference books and reputed journals for central and departmental library.
- ➤ UGC sponsored research based seminars, workshops symposiums should be organized.
- Eminent resource persons from different universities should be invited in the institution to convey their valuable opinion for the promotions of research related activities.
- Faculty members should take intensive effort to publish more articles in reputed journals, books etc.
- > Implementation of the recommendation of Research Promotion Committee:
- > Some of the permanent teachers completed P.hD and engaged in further research activities and the rest are pursuing P.hD.
- > Some of the part-time teachers and guest faculties are also engaged in research activities.

The IQAC comprising of Senior Faculty members headed by the Principal cover the aspect of research promotion in its regular meetings. Whenever need arises the IQAC keeps open the option of expert consultation.

For instance, several meetings were conducted by the IQAC with research promotion committee to chalk out the blueprint for conducting UGC-sponsored seminar and workshop. The mentioned seminars were both state and national level sponsored by the UGC and organized by the departments of Political Science, Economics, Bengali, Education, History and Geography.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

Autonomy to the principal investigator:

➤ The Principal investigator is the key Person to make plan and structure of the project.

Timely availability or release of resources:

> Till now one faculty member applied for Minor Project (UGC- sponsored) and the title of the project is 'Plastic Recycling Industry in Sujapur', but sanction has not come yet.

Adequate infrastructure and human resources:

Although no research project has been granted by the UGC till now but the institution has infrastructural facility to operate research project up to some extent. The college has available internet facility (Wi-Fi), e-resource (journals and books), and research oriented books in the library also. Map making software is available and laboratory of the lab based department may also helpful to operate the project work up to limited extent.

Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers:

- ➤ Departmental adjustments with the active support of Principal sanctioning leave & load- distribution in place.
- > During the summer recesses the faculty can utilize the recess for conducting research activities as per statute of the affiliating university (UGB). In this connection the college authority is so co-operative.
- ➤ The College authority allows on duty absence (leave) as per the statute of the University

Support in terms of technology and information needs:

- The institution has GIS and RS (21ST Century) software for handling spatial data and map making.
- ➤ The college has sophisticated GPS.

- Laboratories of chemistry, zoology and botany may also be helpful for research work in the concerned discipline.
- > Surveying instruments (Theodolite, Dumpy Level etc) are available in the department of geography for field survey.
- Internet facility is available for 24 hrs in the campus.
- ➤ The institution has also easy access to e-journals and e-books (INFLIBNET and SAGE)
- > facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities:
- No project work is handled by the faculty in the institution till now although one proposal submitted to UGC. The institution has conducted State and National level UGC sponsored seminar in different period and all utilization certificates have been submitted to the funding authority. Proper auditing of all grants is done by the authority of the college sincerely.

Any other:

- ➤ Computers are in all the departments of the institution.
- Research oriented books and journals are also in the library up to some extent. Spaces for research work (infrastructure).
- > Seminars are organized regularly.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- Few departments are organizing seminar lectures by eminent Teachers from external institutions.
- > Students are encouraged to write creative article at Wall Magazine and College Magazine.

Especially the department of Education, Political Science, History, Geography and Biological sciences are conducted such type of field survey and project work.

The policy of college is to attract more and more students to attend the class and provide them up-to- date and new information, so that they can pass out from the institution not only with syllabus based knowledge but also with all necessary knowledge to meet the need of this modern age.

Curricular and co-curricular activities

- Classrooms: Presently there are 15 classrooms, and 8 laboratories including Language lab & Education Lab. All the classrooms are equipped with black/white board, and if teacher requires, he/she uses over head projector and laptop with LCD screen. All Labs are also well equipped with advanced technology and instruments and these labs are specially used for practical classes. A Plan also has been made for a new building which will consist of 10 Class Rooms under Rastriya Ucchatara Siksha Abhiyan (RUSA) Grant.
- Technology oriented Class Room: There are four Digital Class Rooms with advanced and latest technology and the institution also has a movable projector always kept ready for serving additional purpose. These Class Rooms attract more students to attend the classes regularly and these facilities also help the Students to get new intellectual input. The computer lab is also used for teaching purpose.

Apart from that all departments of the college are equipped with Computer and internet facility and that are being used for teaching purpose.

Multi-functional Conference Hall:

The College has a Multi-functional Conference Hall. Besides this, the college also has some wide and specious class rooms that are also used as a temporary seminar hall.

- ➤ Tutorial Class Rooms: The New and Smart classrooms are used for tutorial purposes during slack session/hours.
- Laboratories: The College has 8 laboratories equipped with modern technology and instruments namely Botany lab, Chemistry lab, Zoology lab, Physics lab, Geography Lab, Education Lab, Computer Lab and Language Lab.
- Ayurvedic Garden: The College has an Ayurvedic Garden in front of College which consists of different types of plants species. This Garden is maintained by the NSS Unit of the College.
- Research Facility: To promote research in the college, the College authority has taken several steps. The Principal encouraged the faculties to enrol themselves in Ph.D and guided them to conduct minor and major research projects. If Teachers seek leave for the purpose of pursuing their PhD, the Principal grants them leave as per norms of the college and affiliated university.

Different e-journals and e-books such as **Inflibnet/N-List**, **Sage**, have been subscribed by the College authority in the interest of promoting research.

College Sports: The College has a large playground to the left of the main entrance. The college has a concerned committee to conduct several spots all the year round. The Annual sports are organized every year. Prizes and trophies are given to the participants in the annual sports. In addition to that the college tied upped with the Malda Centre of Students' Health Home, West Bengal that provides all minor and major health facilities i.e General Health Check Up, all types of Medical Tests, Operation and Medicine to the students at free of cost.

The College has Wi-Fi system which covers the whole Campus premises. It connects every Department of the College to search and download the expected and subject related topic or article.
- Language improvement classes (as a pro active procedure of communication skills) are also being conducted beyond class teaching.

- The Kaliachak College has a First Aid and Medical Committee to look after related matters. First Aid boxes serve the purpose of minor injuries of staff and students to be usually taken care of.
- The Kaliachak College organises several Health Camps all around the year namely free Eye Check up, Thelasemia awareness programme. In addition to that the Students are benefited from medical advice and treatment by specialized medical practitioners at the Students' Health Home, a state-level

autonomous health organization, on payment of a subsidized annual subscription of Rs. 5.00 only.

- In case of emergency, the College send the patient immediately to Kaliachak Block Primary Health Centre by the Ambulance.

For additional information it is noted that only one incident of grievance has been reported and the Cell immediately shorted out the matter.

Women's Cell:

A Women Cell has been set up for addressing all the issues relating to women. The coordinator of the Cell is Mrs. Bijoya Mishra (Head, Dept. of Pol. Science).

Counseling and Career Guidance

➤ Kaliachak College has set up a Career Counselling Cell which organizes career related different programmes on Career guidance time to time.

Placement Unit

The Placement unit is not yet established. But The College authority is quite sympathetic towards the placement of the passed out students. When any vacancy is created in the college the appointing authority tried to fill it with the ex-students. So long, the College appointed four of its passed out students two in Teaching post and two in nonteaching posts. In addition to that ex-students are given due preferences for any auction, tender or quotations.

Therefore, safe drinking water is an urgent issue. The District Authority established an arsenic free water plant in the college campus. The College campus has a PHE arsenic free water supply connection from Baishnabnagar Plant.

A proposal has been sent to the UGC for building of an auditorium in the College Campus.



- The COSA software is also successfully using by the office to deal with the salary related matters of the staff.
- The library software SOUL which is functioning smoothly, for cataloguing books. CAS software recommended by UGC is running quite comfortably. The computerized cataloguing of the backlog is in progress. Computerized cataloguing has been successfully implemented in our college.
- Management Software (CMS). The objective of this is to design and implement software solutions that provide suitably detailed reports in an accurate, consistent and timely manner for smooth functioning or management of College administration. A comprehensive database consisting of all information related to student activity in academic or non academic field is absolutely vital. Proper systematic documentation of the same is required periodically. We have to prepare and provide similar information multiple times and it is a repetitive

- effort and wastage of institute effort & time. This student data management software is extremely necessary.

- Generally as far as practicable for the institution, a constant effort is made to provide dedicated and secure space for equipments and tools.





- The College has keen desire to provide its students Higher education facilities so that it has taken initiatives and sent proposal for PG Courses in Different Subjects (Regular and Distance Mode) to University of Gour Banga, Malda, Rabintra Bharati University, Kolkata ,Madras University, Chennai, Jamia Millia Islamia University, New Delhi and Burdawan University.
- The College has training courses in collaboration with Jawaharlal Nehru National Youth Centre, Malda for Basic Computer Application which aims to encourage the students to acquire the entrepreneurial skills. In addition to that The Institution has planned to start Self-Financed career-oriented courses such as Certificate, Diploma and Advanced Diploma courses in Arabic and English Language as well as Diploma in Medical Lab Technician very soon. As an initiative of the aforesaid courses a language lab of 48 seats, equipped with modern advanced technology is ready.



General Secretary and five office bearers namely the Cultural Secretary, Game Secretary, Magazine Secretary, Girls Common Room and Boys Common Room Secretary, and Students' Welfare Secretary of the Union Secretary. There is a teacher-in-charge for every sub-committee. The structure is as follows:



The Principal is the President of the Students' Union. He controls all the activities of all the sub committees in association to the faculty in charge and the General Secretary of the union.

- The most notable point of the union is its apolitical nature, which encourages a political leadership through which only those having requisite ability to lead from the front are elected by the students. Students' Union Election takes place each year peacefully and democratically without any external interference whatsoever.
- The General Secretary of the Students' Union is an important member of the college Governing Body and shoulders a great deal of responsibility for the advancement and progress of the college by being a party to all the important and major policy making decisions.
- Every Student contributes once a sum of Rs.70/- (Seventy) to the students' union. The annually collected amount is distributed equally among all the subcommittees.
- It is carefully observed that this fund is properly utilized in the specific purpose of the Union and also the welfare fund is distributed among the poor and needy students for purchasing text books, study materials and Stationeries etc.

6.1.1. Kaliachak College is acting out its mission proclamation in materializing the vision declaration:

The college does pledge to ensure suitable infrastructure, support services, research facilitated and learners' friendly, skill oriented environment for development of personality for the building of the nation. The institution aspires to attract bright talents as input and to remould them as human wealth output. This college provides ample scope for multifaceted development of the youths and of the stake holders irrespective of religion, race, caste, gender and region.

- Utmost effort for holistic development of learners to their full potential as value based human being of the globe and the responsible citizen of the nation;
- ➤ Highest standards of ethics and conducts in teaching, learning and research;
- Close interaction with all stakeholders as well as the segments of the society extending possible support for proper progression of them;
- Learning for eternal life to be globally ambitious and regionally rooted, and
- Academic freedom to the faculty and the learner to engage in intellectual discourse

6.1.2. What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Principal is usually a teacher who is completely familiar to the spirit of the institution. He has two advisory bodies to frame quality parameters. The Governing Body is the apex decision making body of the college which has representatives from stake holders like the affiliating university, the state government, present teachers & non teaching staff and Students. After Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2011, the IQAC assists the Principal in chalking out the necessary plans:

- a) Academic programmes, mode of transaction of the lesson, evaluation and their co-curricular activities;
- b) Infrastructural blue prints related to academic needs & campus management
- c) Value Education programmes.
- d) Authentication of data by incumbent applying under CAS (Career Advancement Scheme) by IQAC Convenor

The GB and IQAC meet at regular intervals jointly and separately to monitor the implementation of the programmes. The IQAC plays a more active role because the standing Cell consists of present teachers headed by the IQAC Coordinator, who survey the entire college and engages in motivating the faculty and students to realize the obligations while fulfilling the regular academic programmes. The IQAC & Finance committee also assist the Principal in following up with government authorities of funding and infrastructural development.

In order to fulfil the stated mission, the Principal involves himself in every policy decision by presiding over each and every meeting and giving his valued opinions and suggestions. On every policy statement and action plan for the fulfilment of the stated mission he asks suggestion from the senior faculty members and of the IQAC Core Committee. In each IQAC and Teachers' Council meeting things are openly discussed and decisions are taken quite democratically.

6.1.3. What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring:

- the policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission
- > To improve the quality of teaching & learning the principal always tries his best. He provided four smart Class rooms with ICT facility. Computer Lab, fully wi-fi campus for the betterment of the Teaching-learning process.
- **To ensure students participation** into the regular teaching-learning process monthly basis unit test was introduced; Principal in consultation with the

Teachers' council frames policies. Thus the Teachers follow the policy for the greater interest of the students.

- ➤ To ensure efficient use of the resources the authority follows all formalities e.g. Auction, quotation, Tender, e-tender etc. There are Finance Committee, Purchase committee, Budget Committee for efficient use and management of resources.
- To develop the skill of the faculty and administrative staff special skill development programmes are arranged in collaboration with different NGOs in Public Private Partnership (PPP) model, like Nehru Yuba Computer Training Centre. Faculty Members are sent to attend Orientation programme, Refresher Course, Advanced Course in information Technology and any special academic programme related to the improvement of the faculties concerned.
- **To promote the value added programmes** e.g. DMLT Course, Orientation Programme and Short Courses for faculty improvement of the colleges the institute made a collaboration with Centre for Academic Leadership and Education Management, UGC/HRDC, Aligarh Muslim University
- The Principal pays regular visit to all the wings for keeping it in right track and speed.
- To remove gender disparity and to resist early marriage of the girls the authority encourages the girl students for higher education by forwarding and guiding them to avail financial help and various stipend provided by the State Government as well as the NGOs like Kanyashree Prakalpa, (for Girls only), Minority welfare Scholarship, SC/ST/OBC Scholarship, Chief Minister's Relief Fund, Uttar Banga Development, Swami Vivekananda Relief Fund, from the govt. of W.B, Merit Cum Means Scholarship of the DPI&UGC Bidi Labour Development Fund (Strictly for Bidi labour Family), Begum Rokeya Memorial Foundation Scholarship (for Muslim Girls only), Sitaram Jhindal Foundation, Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Foundation, , Hazi Mohammad Mohsin Memorial Scholarship etc.
- Seat Reservation for the Girls: As the institute is co-ed college, guided by the laws of the state govt. and the affiliating university there is no scope for seat reservation for the girls students. However, seat reservations are made statutory in the Students Union Election. For Every class there should be at least one Girl Representative.
- **The Gender Sensitization** Cell always keeps vigils on the issues related to the women so that their right may remain protected.
- formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan
 - The policy statements and action plans for fulfilment of the stated mission:
 - The Apex Administrative Body of the college has a motto to do the necessary

task by democratic way with the help of decentralized committees. The Institute always maintains a balance between the centralized and decentralized method of the policy implementation. Once the policies are formulated, executive committees are constituted under the leadership of the Principal.

- Interaction with stakeholders
 The Principal interacts with the faculty members, nonteaching staff, students
 and the guardians whenever necessary for a qualitative improvement of the
 college. Parent-teacher meetings are held at departmental levels as well where,
 if necessary, the Principal also intervenes.
- Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

 The Principal takes time out of her busy schedule and makes regular as well as surprise visits to the departments and offices as a step to ensure excellence everywhere and at all times. For instance the college identified a group of students belong to the SC/ST& Minority community who are first generation learners who are lagging behind the general students. It was decided to apply to the UGC under the XIth Plan for starting a remedial coaching and entry in coaching centre for up liftmen of the backward students in particular and the community in general.
- Reinforcing the culture of excellence
 There is a cultural sub-committee to conduct annual cultural programme where
 the students show their performances in terms of the music, recitation, dance,
 drama, debate, speech etc. on the open stage provided by the college. The
 Magazine Sub-committee on the other hand published annual magazine with the
 essays, short stories, poems composed by the students, faculty and non-teaching
 staff along with the performance reports of various wings. ALL departments
 have their respective wall magazine where the voice of the departmental
 students is echoed. During the celebration of the Teachers' Day, Independence
 Day, Republic Day, College Foundation Day and during the celebration of
 birthday of different great personalities cultural programme are also staged.
- Champion organizational change The recommendations of the Governing Body are considered wherever and whenever possible. Suggestions from stakeholders are kept in mind. For instance a Grievance Redressal Box has been in place in response to students' demands. The Anti Ragging Cell, Gender Sensitization Cell formed to meet the dynamic needs of the time.

The Principal monitors all the ongoing projects and always actively engaged in a live consultation with the Secretary, Teachers' Council, Coordinator, IQAC, Senior Governing Body members , the Heads of the concerned departments and senior- in-charge of key areas. The Librarians and the Head Clerk are always in touch if policies concern their jurisdiction

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Principal guides the Secretary of the Teachers' Council, in preparing the Academic Calendar, which comes into effect at the beginning of every Academic Session. Each department maintains a Progress Report' Register to note down the progress of the students. The Principal checks the daily attendance of the teachers, allotted classes, number of class taken by the teachers, class not taken (if any), reasons, other duty performed and special classes taken by them and recorded into the register and give his comments. He critically goes through the feedback forms filled by students of all departments on the respective teachers, librarians and talks to the concerned teachers or librarian who is poorly evaluated by the students.

6.1.6. How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

Seniors faculty members are entrusted with the charge of Principal's Office in the absence of the Principal. They also head various academic and administrative committees to run the college. The academic and cultural programmes the college hosts, speak on the team spirit and organizational skills of the Faculty. Teachers of the college act as coordinators, Convenors, Secretary, Programme Officers etc taking over the mantle of the controller while pursuing their own academic, administrative and other activities concerning the college as a whole. Junior teachers work with senior teachers in various Committees such as Governing Body, Teachers' Council, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Employees Cooperative, NSS Advisory Committee, Budget Committee, Finance Committee etc. This enables them to learn while assisting and prepares replacements as and when the seniors retire.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

Heads of the Departments normally take many decisions such as purchases of the Departmental books, unit test, any other programmes in general for the respective departments by informing the Principal rather than by seeking Principal's permission.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

The Principal prefers to take decisions democratically. Thus instead of imposing his decisions on the faculty, he consults heads of the departments before taking any major decision. He has a number of Auxiliary Committees for this purpose. The conveners of those committees and departmental heads, the librarians and the Head clerk, Accountant, Treasurer & the IQAC convener are all engaged in by the Principal in the form of consultants.

6.2. Strategy Development and Deployment


6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes. The Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) is prepared every year. The IQAC Annual Plan addresses the quality policy of the year before and records its implementation along with the formal blue print of the projection for the forthcoming year.

The Institute Plans for development of a Seminar Hall, Renovation of Office, and Extension of the class rooms which was duly articulated in the current IQAR and the RUSA granted fund for the same. The outgoing batch of UG students fill in Feedback forms to indicate performance of all the teachers of the respective departments, including Part Time and Guest Teachers. They also fill in feedback forms for the Library and the Office. Suggestions received from the feedback are recorded departmentally in the meeting of the faculty members, and all inputs are considered and integrated as far as practicable

6.2.6. How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

Meetings are held regularly at all levels, not only to frame policies but also to implement them and monitor feedback on the outcome of the implementations. Attendance of all concerned members is mandatory in these meetings. Under special circumstances, a faculty member is ready to come to college, even it falls in preparatory day.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by the Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

The Governing Body of the college meets as and when required. In the last year six meetings of the body has been conducted and the all the resolutions are preserved in the Principal's office. Almost all the resolutions have been successfully implemented while the few are in the process of completion.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

The institution is under dual control. It is under the Higher Education Directorate of the Government of West Bengal for administrative purpose and under the University of Gour Banga for academic purpose. The Directorate does not have a Policy as yet in allowing the college to apply for autonomy.

6.2.9. How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The College has a Grievance Redressal Cell. Two senior teachers are in charge of this cell. A Complaint Box is kept in the Main gate of the college where teachers, students as well as non teaching staff may drop letters or notes of complaint. Complaints are promptly attended to and sought to be resolved in consultation with the Principal. The Principal himself meets visitors which the guardians may avail themselves for placing their grievances directly to the Principal for redressal of the same. Minor cases are resolves as follows:

- Students' grievances through General Secretary
- Teachers' grievances through Teachers' Council Secretary
- Non-teaching Staffs' grievances through Head Clerk
- 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

The only Case filed by an admission seeking candidate claiming his admission in B.A. 1st year class; but judgment comes in favour of the college because he passed the H.S from a board not recognized by the affiliating university.

The Principal goes through all the filled in feedback forms related to the performances of the Teachers, Library and the Office.

- ➤ He meets the teachers and librarians and clerical staff individually if he feels it necessary and advises them. Confidential Reports (during the time of career advancement) given by the Principal also have a reflection of the same.
- For the Office-Staff, necessary steps are taken.
- Apart from the Feedback forms, there is a grievance box in which students and teachers as well as non teaching staff, put in their grievances which are given due attention.

Above all IQAC meetings also include 'Performance Lacuna' in the agenda.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

- The Principal grants duty leave to the faculty members for participating in Orientation Program and Refresher Courses, Short courses, Training, Seminars and Workshop held related to the interest of the faculty members.

 - ➤ Departmental level meetings and closed door meetings with the Principal are held whenever required to regulate discharge of allocated duties and responsibilities of Faculty.
 - Non-teaching staff members are time to time called under the aegis of the Head clerk in the presence of the Principal to ensure streamlining of operations.

- The relationship quotient between the Principal and faculty is very positive. The need to appraise is rare. On those few occasions private dialogues with the Head (if it involves members other than the Head) in attendance are sufficient motivating strategies.

Government of West Bengal has provisions for several welfare schemes which are available for both teachers as well as non teaching staff

- Employees Cooperative Credit Society for financial support of the Teaching and non-teaching staff of the college.
- There is a fund developed from the contribution of the non-teaching staff and is meant for the financial help of the both teaching and non-teaching staff.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?


- The Principal is not the appointing authority. Within his limited capacity he is vigilant to see that in all seminars enlightened educationists, social activists, philanthropists are invited to give maximum exposure to students. Sometimes eminent professors of the neighboring universities and retired professors in different field are invited to deliver special lecture.
- The College uses all possible avenues to apply for grants to which it is entitled in the 2(f) and 12(b) category to promote research. At the institutional level educational tours is always permitted.

There are established procedures and processes for planning and allocation of financial resources. The institution has developed strategies for mobilizing resources and ensures transparency in financial management of the institution. - Internal funds managed by Treasurers.
- > Computerization of salary, arrear and fees collection.

- The college has its own resource generating system through the tuition fees collected from the students and from the auction of the litchi orchard own by the college. But the major source of fund is the Development grant from the Directorate of Public Instruction, Govt. of West Bengal, University Grant Commission, Rashtiya Ucchatara SikshaAbhiyan (RUSA), Local MLA and MPs Fund, Multi-Sectoral Development Project. Apart from these, the college receives grants from the Govt. of West Bengal for payment of salaries to its staff.

The college sends proposals for additional grants to the UGC, DPI, BEUP, MSDP, under various plans and whenever necessary. In order to meet expenses for construction of new building, repair and renovation the college applies for both the State Government and UGC funds. The college also applies for additional fund to meet seminar, expenses over and above the allotted amount.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

IQAC was established on the 01.07.2012. on the basis of the Students feedback report the coordinator suggested

- ➤ PG course in regular mode for Bengali, History, Arabic are pending for approval of the university.
- P.G Course on Distance mode from Vidya Sagar, Rabindrabharati, University of West Bengal, Madras Tamil Nadu and Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi. The proposals were sent to the respective Universities; but yet to get positive response.
- The Proposal of the Language lab with a number of Skill Development programme has been approved and implemented;
- Conference Hall was also developed as was proposed by the IQAC
- But the proposal for a seminar hall is yet to be implemented
- b. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Prof. Bikash Roy, Deptt. of Bengali, University of Gou Banga is an external member of the IQAC. He made a significant contribution to encourage research culture among the faculty members. There is another external member Dr. Mehedi Hassan, Asst. Professor, Deptt. of Arabic, University of Gour Banga. He also participated in the IQAC meeting and highlights the strength, weakness of the development programme.

c. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IOAC?

The Alumni and the students help the IQAC by providing their feedback on that basis the IQAC formulate its development plan. For example the college started the Philosophy and Sociology honours courses on the basis of the students feedback.

d. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The Coordinator, IQAC places his requirement to the Principal; and the Principal allot the necessary staff to the service of the IQAC as and when required.

Yes, The IQAC, Teachers' Council, Acadic council and the Governing Body are the main decision making bodies integrated each other through the common members. The Quality concern of the IQAC is considered into the Teachers' Council and academic council and the Governing Body and the Necessary policy is framed to be implemented by the executive body.

- As the institution is not autonomous there is no scope for such in house programmes unless permitted by the state government. However, the college sends its coordinator to workshops and seminars on quality enhancement held in the nearby universities. The idea is to learn and disseminate and to showcase the achievements of the college especially its Best Practices.

- The daily attendance register also records the teachers' attendance, class allotted, class taken, class not take, cause of not taking the class, other duties performed etc. and ratified by the principal;
- ➤ Directorate of Public Instruction, Directorate of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal checks the data occasionally;

- ➤ Kaliachak College can claim to be an extremely well organized institution with very definite programming of all its activities.
- Academic activities like Time Table management to ensure continuous, uninterrupted strike free teaching in concurrence with varied activities are practised. Internal Unit Tests are held on schedule and results are always published duly.
- The campus remains disciplined under the supervision of teaching staff and the students union allowing freedom of creativity and expression.
- The campus is completely ragging free.
- Since the college is a Government aided college the Principal has to keep constant liaison with the Higher Education Department and Directorate of Government of West Bengal. In some cases he has to maintain contact with the University of Gour Banga and Higher Education Council, West Bengal.
- Academic Calendars prepared by the Principal and a team are distributed to the faculty at the onset of the New Session. It is also displayed in The Students' Notice Boards.
- There are Performance base Attendance Registers in which the teachers themselves mention the nature of regular and extraordinary duties and the Principal puts note on the record every day.

Yes. The college conducts a Green Audit of its campus. An assessment of solar project is made. The proposal is being submitted to the UGC for a grant. The institution is situated on the bank of *Pagla River* and it may be called that the campus can access natural resources in ease.

The Institution uses more electricity saving LED Bulbs, Fans and Air-Conditioners only where and whenever it require.

It is to be noted that natural sun lights and fresh air enters into most of the college rooms as it is surrounded by a plenty of tries.

The college has decided to introduce a solar energy in the campus.

The Institution has a pond in its campus water is done in its dimension.

- Dam is constructed on the bank the Pagla River by the Irrigation Department, Government of West Bengal to protect the college from the flood of Pagla.

***** Efforts for Carbon neutrality:

Biological measure of carbon neutrality is taken by the college by planting different type of trees every year.

* Plantation:

The institution has a plenty of Trees in its campus. Apart from that NSS Unit of this college every year plants different types of trees. There is a litchi orchard in the possession of the college.

* Hazardous waste management:

This college campus is in the lap of nature and the institution runs two undergraduate programs i.e. Arts and Science. The wastes of science laboratories are buried under ground regularly by the sectional employee.

* e-waste management:

There is an established system of e-waste management in this institution. The electronic and electrical wastes are identified and repaired but wastes which cannot be repaired are sold to the right agency.

- Also the internally Inter-disciplinary seminars are organized by the institution and the students from various department and faculty members are enthusiastically joined and share valuable knowledge in this regard.
- Students are also motivated to participate and present their papers in various seminars and workshops organized by the other academic Institutes.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices in the given format at page no.98, which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Title: I Online Admission

As per the order of the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal, the college has introduced online admission process form the Session 2015-2016.

This process has served better in improving whole admission process as it proves transparency in selecting eligible candidates and facilitated students of the remote areas to get admission. Apart from that it reduced the requirement of man power in admission process.

Context: There was off-line process in the college admission but it has many drawbacks. The eligible candidates were deprived in many cases. That is why the college authority has decided to introduce online admission process instead of off-line process.

Practice: As college has introduced online admission process to bring transparency in admission, it has hired software from company to carry out the whole admission process. The admission process include

- > To invite application form
- To prepare merit list within specified period
- Documents verification of eligible candidates
- Payment of wiling candidates through bank
- Completed admission process

Evidence of success:

The online admission proves to be very fruitful in transparency of whole admission process. The students are feeling easier and did not face any difficulties and hazard of standing in long queue. The meritorious students have given better chance. The workload of office staff has been reduced.

Problem encountered and Resource required:

Besides bright sides of the online admission process it has few shortcomings e.g. sometime software does not work properly due to failure of the server. There is no offline facility to apply.

- Rural Bengal is lacking the high speed internet Facility to avail the benefit of online admission process;
- Those who are first generation learners are not familiar with the internet and computer. They have to depend on the cyber café that causes some extra expenditure and at the same time mistakes committed out of carelessness.
- This process needs highly developed software. The college has to take help from the reputed IT Company to carry out process smoothly.

Title: II Guardian meets

The guardian meet is a program held between teachers and students' guardian once in a year for development of education related matters in the college. They forwarded suggestion for the purpose. The college implemented them.

Context: Guardian meeting is very positive step taken by the college authority. It is very effective method in smooth operation of learning and teaching process. The meeting followed by two processes: in the first, the letters are sent to guardian to attend college on a particular date to discuss with teacher regarding the problems and shortcomings of the students. In second step, sometime teacher go to student home individually and meet the guardian to care they need and problem of the students.

Practice: Guardian meet by the teacher is one of the best several practices, the college continues it. Sometimes the teacher of college interacts with guardian at their home individually. The teachers discuss with them regarding the problems faced by the students and try to solve these in guardian meeting.

Evidence of success: The guardian meets is successful to solve the problems of students. This process encourages the students very much and make them teacher friendly. They get interest in the college study and have become punctual, regular in attending classes and the maintenance of discipline became more effective.

Problem encountered and Resource required:

Though the guardian meet is very effective process but it has many problems. The most of the students belong to remote area, so it is difficult to visit their village. It can be solved if teachers are provided vehicles and transport facilities.

Kaliachak College sincerely made attempts to address areas pointed out by the Peer Team of the 1st Cycle of Accreditation in 2011. The college proceeds with the message of EDUCATE SKILLAGE INNOVATE EMPOWER to use the unused corners in academics and research to benefit its primary stakeholders, the students in particular and other stakeholders in general as well as the society and the nation as a whole. The Principal's Preface and the Self Study Report record all the initiatives and achievements.

The more notable highlights follows

- ⇒ New courses introduced at UG levels considering growing demands for higher education.
- ⇒ Proposal submitted to the University for opening PG courses in regular mode as well as in distance mode.
- ⇒ ICT enable infrastructure are enhanced, upgraded, used and managed in a sustainable manner in classrooms, library and in office.
- ⇒ The college pays special attention for modernization, up-gradation and computerization of the Kobi Kazi Nazrul Islam library (Central Library). Library facility is enhanced with many more reference books and academic journals along with e-books and e-journals
- ⇒ For systematic personal care to the main beneficiary, the students' community mentoring system is developed under the Career and Counselling Cell, Training and Placement Cell, Welfare Committee of the Students Union and the Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti Sexual Harassment Committee and the Anti Ragging Squad of the college.
- ⇒ The college made effort to employ more faculty on permanent full time basis.
- ⇒ Better gender balance in staff and faculty is tried to maintain.
- ⇒ Efforts to establish research culture become a practice among the faculties, invitation as resource person is availed, presentation of research paper in international, in national seminars, publication in research journal are done, minor research project is applied for.
- ⇒ The computer lab of the college is augmented with many more equipment.
- ⇒ The college forwards sufficient numbers of forms for scholarships in favour of students for having financial assistance.
- ⇒ Efforts have been made to establish NCC UNIT in the college, the concerned authority has consented to introduce the same in this session.

- ⇒ The process of construction of the building of Girls Hostel is taken seriously by the college authority, though the PWD, the authorised agency for this purpose showed a slow process due to the change of their head office from Berhampur to Malda.
- ⇒ The college has taken effective steps for have a grant for construction of boys' hostel beside the campus.
- ⇒ 'Earn while you learn' schemes are not easy to introduce in rural based institute of higher education like us but we have taken steps to open some certificate and diploma courses in job oriented programmes for the alumni as well as the students. Students are employed as Civic Volunteers in local police stations.
- ⇒ Efforts have been made to fill up the admission quota from various reserved categories by providing sufficient publicity through website, noticeboard, students' union and local public places. In respect of placement in government and non -government jobs the candidates from reserved categories are getting preference.
- ⇒ The college encouraged the students to develop sports activities through students union and the sports committee. Along with these facilities are provided by appointing sports instructor. The students performed very well in the state level sports.
- ⇒ Methods of Teaching-learning analysed and modified time to time.
- ⇒ Remedial Courses done to encourage slow learners.
- ⇒ Greater attention is paid in research and all the faculty members (full time) are engaged in research work
- ⇒ Extension activities are carried out with NSS and Extension Education Committee.
- ⇒ Gymnasium with more user-friendly equipment is introduced to motivate students and faculty to become physically stronger.
- ⇒ Emphasis is given to the activities of Women's Cell
- ⇒ The college maintains a clean and green campus which is monitored by the Gardening and Beautification Committee.
- ⇒ Career Counselling Cell with the Training and Placement woks to bridge the gap between academics and employment.
